nward into 2018 | City Sets Priorities









The Tallahassee City Commission held its annual goal-setting retreat on January 10 at the Tallahassee International Airport. Based on input from each member, the Commission established its community priorities for 2018, which reaffirm and build upon those set for 2016 and 2017.

After a day of thorough, in-depth discussions about public safety, economic development and a variety of other issues, Commissioners developed four focus areas, each with a subset of key issues, to guide City government and continue momentum to propel Tallahassee forward.

Public Safety

Strengthening public safety efforts continues to be a priority. Demonstrating progress over the past year, there has been a 13.77 percent reduction in overall crime in our community when compared to the same timeframe in 2016, based on crime reported to both the Tallahassee Police Department and the Leon County Sheriff's Office through November 2017. During the coming year, public safety efforts will continue, which includes the expansion of neighborhood-level initiatives, support of the TEMPO program and strengthening partnerships.

Economic Development

Recent data show that Tallahassee has the fastest growing economy per capita in the state. Efforts to support and continue this positive trend will continue in 2018. Specifically, continued investment in infrastructure will support the 95 current development projects and lay the groundwork for future projects. The Commission requested more information in order to evaluate the economic development potential related to the airport and to consider the airport governance structure. Workforce training will also be key as the City works to ensure economic prosperity benefits are inclusive and representative. Infrastructure PlanningInfrastructure investment will continue in 2018. During the budget process, the Commission approved \$6.5 million for transportation infrastructure. There will be a continued focus on maintenance and repair of City facilities, such as roadways, sidewalks and utilities. From major projects like the FAMU Way extension and Market District Multi-Purpose Stormwater Project to neighborhood projects like speed humps on Skyland Drive and sidewalk improvements on Glenview Drive, work will take place across the community. To meet the needs of a changing and growing community, a focus will be placed on key areas, such as affordable housing, senior services and pedestrian mobility and safety. As a Tree City USA, Tallahassee's canopy is an iconic element of the community, and the urban forestry master plan currently under development will continue to safeguard this beloved feature, especially along community gateways. Community engagement and public information will continue to be vital to ensure our quality of life reflects residents' needs.

Utility Upgrades Under North Monroe

The City of Tallahassee is committed to investing in its infrastructure to ensure residents continue to receive reliable, high quality services. In January, replacement of aging sewer and water pipes under North Monroe Street began. Work is taking place at night between the hours of 8 p.m. and 5 a.m. Sunday through Friday. Limited portions of the corridor will be impacted nightly, and one lane of traffic in each direction will be maintained. At the end of each evening's construction activities, the driving surface will be restored with asphalt patching, and all travel lanes will be re-opened to traffic for daytime use. New Year, New Energy Source

On January 1, our community's first solar farm came online, feeding the City of Tallahassee's electric grid with clean, green energy produced by the sun. The 20-megawatt (MW), 120-acre solar farm, which sits on the property of the Tallahassee International Airport (TLH), is one of the largest solar farms in the state, capable of producing nearly 37 million kilowatt hours (kWh) of electricity each year. Currently, Tallahassee Solar, the City's solar program, is fully subscribed; however, there is waiting list in preparation for the second solar farm. WRAP offers Payment Relief

To offset the extreme cold this winter, City utility customers have been using more energy as they warm their homes. To help ease the financial burden this may bring, the City is offering a one-time payment option for utility customers known as the Winter Relief Assistance Program (WRAP). The alternative payment program allows all residential and non-demand small business utility customers to carry over up to 25 percent of their utility bill in January and February to the following month's bill, when usage will likely be less. To request the carryover option, customers should contact City of Tallahassee Utilities at 891-4968.


