2020 Adopt a Tree Program

As a proud Tree City USA, every year the City of Tallahassee provides and plants trees for eligible homeowners in an effort to increase the urban forest canopy. The trees, depending on the species, are between five and eight feet in height and are species native to the southeast. Eligible homeowners living in the City limits may request up to two trees be planted in the front yard within 100 feet of the centerline of the roadway (within the City limits) and must agree to keep each tree watered for one year.

Tree species offered this year include:

Autumn Brilliance Serviceberry blooms white flowers in early spring, produces sweet purplish berries in the summer (they are edible!) and puts on a fiery foliage show in the fall. It can reach 20 to 25 feet both in height and width at maturity. It is a great tree for small areas or where overhead utilities may be a conflict. It does well in spots with full to partial sun, so it makes a lovely accent for a property border or the front yard.

Nellie R Stevens Holly is one of the most attractive of all hollies. It is a broadleaf evergreen species that bears spiny dark green leaves and round berries. It is low maintenance and can be used as a hedge tree or a privacy screen. It typically reaches a height of about 30 feet and spreads out about 15 feet at its base, resembling a Christmas tree.

Tulip Poplar is the tallest eastern hardwood in North America – it can reach between 80 and 120 feet in height! It has tulip shaped flowers, which are pale green, yellow or white with an orange band, that bloom in midspring and provide nectar for ruby-throated hummingbirds. The leaves turn a pale yellow in the fall. It prefers deep, rich and rather moist soil but not wet soils. It prefers full sun and can grow very quickly (more than 24 inches per year).

WALK BRIGHTLY



Because of limited daylight hours in winter, your daily walk might occur in dark or low-light conditions. Here are tips to help keep you safe:

- Face traffic and walk on the sidewalk. If one is not available, walk as far away from the road as possible.
 - Cross only at designated crosswalks.
 - Put your phone down and take off your headphones.
 - Walk with a friend or group, if possible.

Every April, the City re-sets your residential Maximum Sewer Charge based on your prior winter's water usage. The City calculates your Sewer Max based on the second highest month of metered water usage as billed during December through March, which is when most customers use the least amount of water.
